Luke 13:10-17

Luke 6:7 – According to certain traditions that the scribes and Pharisees had built up around the Law, healing was considered work, and thus was not permissible on the Sabbath. They

believed they served God by zealously keeping these peripheral traditions, but this legalism made them insensitive to God's mercy.

13:16 – Think of it: The Fathers see this command as directing us to a spiritual meaning for the eighteen years. As the Greek expression if literally translated "ten and eight years," both St. Ambrose and Theophylact see ten as representing the Ten Commandments and eight as representing grace, for the day of Resurrection is often called the "eighth day." Thus humanity is lifted up by faith in Christ, Who fulfills both law and grace.

RECTORY OFFICE HOURS are 10 A.M. to 4 P.M. Monday thru Friday.

EMERGENCY SICK CALLS can be made anytime. Please notify your Pastor when someone is taken to the hospital; Sacred Scriptures remind us to call the presbyter to anoint the sick.

MARRIAGES are celebrated on Saturdays and Sundays. Consult the Pastor at least 6 months in advance and before wedding reception plans have been made. Marriages cannot be celebrated during Lent or Advent, or on Fridays.

<u>BAPTISMS</u> are scheduled on Saturdays and Sundays at 11 A.M. Two God-parents are required; at least one of whom must be an Orthodox Christian by Faith, and the other a practicing Christian. An infant's first or middle name must be a saint's name.

<u>CHURCH FUNERALS</u> are provided for parishioners who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations to the Parish. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

The Healing on the Sabbath Day

A woman who has been bowed down with an infirmity for eighteen years is healed on the Sabbath day by Jesus, in a synagogue where He is preaching. The ruler of the synagogue gives vent to his indignation at the day of rest being violated by this work of mercy. Jesus, to the shame of His adversaries and the joy of the people, answers that, if no one thinks anything of loosening his ox or his donkey to take it to water on the Sabbath, then there is much stronger reason to release a daughter of Abraham on this day. Most of us strongly approve of this lesson from the gospel for this Sunday after Pentecost; in principle, we are absolutely in agreement with the free attitude of Jesus towards the Sabbath, and are very ready to accuse the hypocrisy and legalism of the Pharisees and to take a stand against them. But, in fact, it often happens that we imitate them. We are easily shocked by any good work which is not done "according to the rules" – that is, what we ourselves consider to be the indispensable rules. If a person or a group whose beliefs differ from ours, or who belong to a political party of which we disapprove, or that we judge to be morally inferior, achieve some results that are objectively good, but that we did not expect to come from that side, our first instinctive reaction (which is often concealed) is one of skepticism, of resentment or bitterness. Church people are especially prone to the temptation to denigrate and condemn all that is not of "their" orthodoxy. Let his gospel teach us, therefore, to become humble enough, amenable enough to all light from above to admit - with joy and gratitude the good that can be done through other channels than those which, rightly or wrongly, we consider "proper." May God make us able, when faced by any "healing on the Sabbath," to feel what the people who surrounded Jesus felt: "... all the people rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by Him."

THE NATIVITY FAST (ADVENT)

With the Advent Fast (aka Philip's Fast, Apostles' Fast, Christmas Fast) in our midst, I offer the following for you to contemplate in order for all of us to prepare ourselves adequately for the Nativity of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

What Should I be Doing?

- } (1) **Pray.** Find time each morning and each evening to pray. If you do not follow a "prayer rule," speak with Father and he will help you.
- } (2) **Read Scripture.** A useful exercise during the Nativity Fast is to choose a Gospel (Mark is a good choice), and read one chapter each day. But read the

- chapter aloud and slowly. Then sit in silence for a few minutes and reflect on any words or images that grabbed your attention.
- 3) Fast. Observe the Church's fasting rules. Our faith is physical, not just spiritual. And fasting helps us to develop awareness of God's presence and of our dependence upon God for all things.
- (4) Get in the game! Go to church faithfully, offer a personal confession, pray for others, visit the sick, volunteer your time, give sacrificially from what you have, make an attempt to heal broken relationships, decide to get the help you need.
