Matthew 19:16-26

19:16, 17 – This man does not come to test Jesus, but to seek advice from one he considers no more than a **good Teacher.** Christ's response (v. 17) does not deny that He is God, but is designed to lead the rich man to this knowledge.

19:20 – Formal observance of commandments does not make one righteous before God. This man had an earnest desire for eternal life and sensed that he still lacked something; thus, he continues to press Jesus for the answer.

19:21 – To be perfect, one must willingly sacrifice all and **follow** Christ. Nothing is gained unless this sacrifice is given freely. The specifics of how one fellows Christ will be different for each person. Because wealth had such a grip on this rich man, his only hope was to **sell** and **give** away all his possessions. St. John Chrysostom tells us that giving away possessions is the least of Christ's instructions here; following Him in all things is a far greater and more difficult calling.

19:23-26 – Various interpretations have been suggested for the impossible image of a **camel** going through **the eye of a needle:** e.g., that the word was not camel, but "rope"; or that the eye of a needle was a city gate through a camel might barely squeeze if it were first unloaded of all its baggage, symbolizing wealth. Even the Talmud uses the expression "for an elephant to go through the eye of a needle." Whatever the phrase refers to, it displays the impossibility of salvation for those who are attached to riches. This is clearly evidenced by the disciples' response, **"Who then can be saved?"** Yet by God's grace, even what is **impossible** to man can come to pass.

<u>BAPTISMS</u> are scheduled on Saturdays and Sundays at 11 A.M. Two God-parents are required; at least one of whom must be an Orthodox Christian by Faith, and the other a practicing Christian. An infant's first or middle name must be a saint's name.

<u>CHURCH FUNERALS</u> are provided for parishioners who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations to the Parish. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

THE RICH RULER

The gospel for this twelfth Sunday after Pentecost tells us of a rich and powerful man — "a ruler" — who asked Jesus what was needed to inherit eternal life. Jesus reminds him of the commandments. "All these have I kept from my youth up..." He lacks one thing. Jesus tells him: to sell as his goods and distribute them to the poor. "And come, follow me..." But the man goes sorrowfully away, "for he was very rich." And Jesus says that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God.

Sometimes it is material wealth which stops a man from entering the kingdom but there are possessions other than money. Beauty, intelligence, perhaps some disordered human affection or bad habit: these, just as much, can be hindrances which Jesus tells us to free ourselves of before following Him. What are the earthly goods which hold and hinder me, personally, from following Jesus? How can I put these possessions to the service of the poor, and thus liberate my will? The gospel for this Sunday faces each one of us with this question. It is a good question to consider, especially at the time of Our Lord's Nativity, at the time when Jesus comes to us in complete poverty, possessing nothing.

THE CHURCH NEW YEAR BEGINS ON WEDNESDAY!

At Matins for this day, we hear one of the gospel texts of the Resurrection of Christ which are read at matins every Sunday. The chosen text is Luke 24:1-12. Perhaps the reason for this choice lies in the words relating to the holy women: "The first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came unto the sepulcher..." We, too, are invited to turn our thoughts to the Risen Lord at the break of day, at the first light of the year which is beginning on the first day of the week – the week, in this case, being the

year. The central scriptural text for this day is the gospel read at the liturgy (Luke 4:16-22). Jesus, returning to Nazareth, enters the synagogue. He is asked to read the portion of Scripture appropriately to that Sabbath. He opens the scroll of the Prophet Isaiah and reads: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor; He has sent Me to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." Jesus folds up the scroll, sits down and says: "This day is this scripture fulfilled in yours ears." Jesus addresses this same solemn declaration to us at the start of each year. 1 am poor - perhaps materially, but certainly spiritually. 1 am captive - captive of my egoism and of my sin. 1 am blind - for my eyes do not know how to perceive the divine light. 1 am wounded – perhaps by the external circumstances of my life – but much more to my repeated spiritual failures. And all the time, Jesus is there in front of me, and offers me deliverance. He, Himself, is the embodiment of all deliverance and of all forgiveness. If at this moment, l accept His word, His salvation, everything can become new for me. Today: on the first day of the year this offer is made to me. I have heard this divine promise so many times already, at the start of so many years: and have abused this grace so many times, wasting in sin those opportunities opened for my conversion. But, in spite of this accumulation of infidelities, lesus still renews His offer to me: this year which is starting can still be for me "a year of grace of the Lord." I do not know if I shall have the strength and the grace to persevere; but a least, on this first day, I can look towards our Lord in a spirit of faith and consecration. The gospel says: "And the eyes of all who were in the synagogue were fixed on Him." Would that on this first day of the year my eyes might turn away from the defilements in which they take pleasure and fix themselves on Christ – and remain fixed on Him. For, if I have the courage to keep my eyes on Jesus alone, if I do not turn them aside, I shall no longer fall. Lord Jesus, I look at You. I have listened to Your promises. Let me now hear, in a way that is totally personal and intimate, the assurance: "This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears."
