Luke 10:38-42; 11:27-28 -

10:38-42 – Mary and Martha are the sisters of Lazarus, whom Jesus raised from the dead (John **11:1**). Martha is not rebuked for **serving**, but for complaining and be being **distracted**, **worried**, and **troubled**. In following Christ, we serve in order to facilitate the spread of the gospel.

11:27, 28 – These verses are read on most feasts of the Virgin Mary. Jesus corrects the woman from the crowd, not by denouncing his mother, but by emphasizing her faith. People are blessed in God's eyes if, like Mary, they hear the word of God and keep it. The Greek word menounge, here rendered more than that, is translated "Yes indeed" in Rom. 10:18. This word corrects by amplifying, not be negating.

<u>BAPTISMS</u> are scheduled on Saturdays and Sundays at 11 A.M. Two God-parents are required; at least one of whom must be an Orthodox Christian by Faith, and the other a practicing Christian. An infant's first or middle name must be a saint's name. <u>CHURCH FUNERALS</u> are provided for parishioners who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations to the Parish. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

APPARITIONS OF THE MOTHER OF GOD By Proto. Lawrence Barriger's Insights Into The Orthodox Faith

On October 1st (14th), the Church celebrates the Feast of the Protection of the Mother of God. This Feast commemorates the apparition of the Mother of God in the Blachernae Church of Constantinople.

Although the traditions vary concerning when this event happened, most sources agree that it was on October 1st, 911, under the reign of the Emperor Leo the Wise. At that time, Slav barbarians were besieging the city of Constantinople. (Other versions of the story say that there was a plague raging at the time). Many people gathered in the Blachernae Church that was dedicated to the Mother of God to spend the night in prayer. About four o'clock in the morning the Mother of God appeared over the crowd, clad in purple and gold encrusted clothing and spreading out a veil in her hands as though to protect them.

Seeing this vision, St. Andrew the "Fool for Christ" gestured towards it and asked his disciple Epiphanios, "Do you see how the Queen and Lady is praying for all?" The icon of the Protection of the Mother of God reflects this vision and St. Andrew's expression of joy. The annual remembrance of this apparition was the genesis of this beautiful Feast.

Most psychologists and anthropologists would agree that apparitions and visions are a part of the human experience. It is not uncommon that in religious experience there are apparitions. Some accounts of the vision of the "Protection of the Mother of God" in the Blachernae Church claim that St. Andrew and his disciple, St Epiphanios, were the only ones who saw the apparition. Other accounts imply that the Theotokos was seen by all present.

The vision of the Mother of God at the Coptic Orthodox Church of the Theotokos in Zeitun, Egypt in 1968 were witnessed by thousands of people. Orthodox, Roman Catholics, Protestants, Jews, Muslims, and atheists all bore witness to the same thing. The vision of the Mother of God, lasting one time as long as eight hours, did not have any "secret" messages or deliver any explicit detailed instructions on faith or practice. This vision of Mary was not to a select group of visionaries but, like the weeping icon of Chicago that many of us witnessed, was plainly seen by all present and challenged the doubts of all in her presence.

This is perhaps the greatest criterion by which to judge the "authenticity" of any apparition of the Mother of God: it is not given to a select group of "initiates" with

secret instructions but, like the vision of the Mother of God in the Blachernae Church centuries ago, to all who seek her intercession with a pure heart.
