Math. 8:28-34 – The demons, recognizing Jesus as the Son of God, are surprised that their power is being terminated before the time of the last judgment. Though the malice of the demons is great, they can do nothing against the will of God, and thus can only enter the swine at Christ's command. The immediate destruction of the herd shows that the men had been protected by God's care; otherwise, they would have perished under the demonic influence. Further, it reinforces that swineherding was not lawful for the Jews, and shows the incomparable value of human beings, whose salvation is worth every sacrifice.

Luke 8:33 – Some teach that the presence of swine indicates a Gentile population. However, since our Lord forbade His disciples to go to the Gentiles (Math. 10:5) and was Him reluctant to seek out the Gentiles (Math. 15:24), likely these were Jews engaged in a sinful occupation.

Math. 4:15 – The term Galilee of the Gentiles indicates that many non-Jews lived in the region. Having a mixed population, it was not considered a genuinely Jewish land, even though many Gentile residents had converted to Judaism during the Maccabean period. Because many of

considered second-class citizens by the Jews of Judea.

The destruction of the entire **herd** reveals: (1) while animals are a venerable part of creation, man is of far greater value; (2) Christ removes a source of sin, for swine herding was an abomination to the Jews (Dt. 14:8); (3) **demons** have no power over creation, but are subject to the will of God – they could only enter the swine at Christ's command; (4) people are protected under God's providence – otherwise the demon-possessed man would have come to the same end as the swine; (5) the magnitude of the economic loss would remain as a sign for the hardhearted people who fled the region (v. 34).

THE HOUND OF HEAVEN

The Fathers refer to God as the Hound of Heaven. Hound dogs are very persistent. Once they have a scent, they don't give up. God is the Hound of Heaven: He will not leave us alone, He will not leave us in this nice world that we have created for ourselves, which is an illusion, a world which will most surely take us to hell. Even if we don't want Him, He will constantly remind us of Himself. The Fathers say that God becomes the burr under the saddle, the rock that's in your shoe when you're hiking that you can't find and you can't get rid of.

God becomes that for all of us, not because He wants to make our lives miserable, but because He loves us. And we get angry. We get angry at God's reminders and at those He commissions to remind us, such as priests and bishops and pious friends. God doesn't pay attention to our anger. God loves us so much that He sends messengers. We can kill the first messenger, and God sends a second. We can kill the second messenger, and God sends a third. We can kill the third messenger, and God will send a fourth, just as He sent prophet after prophet to the children of Israel.

God hounds us with His love until finally He's backed us into a corner and we have nowhere to go. I'm sure you've been in that corner many times, and you break down and say, "Okay, You beat me. I want You in my life. I believe and I will live by faith."

You would think we would learn our lesson. But you know what happens – we start getting full of ourselves and we start asking God to leave again. God keeps coming after us until we break and say, "Lord, I believe."

This Gospel lesson ultimately is not about the demon-possessed man nor about the villagers. This Gospel lesson is about Jesus and His love for us. This Gospel lesson frightens us, because we know that we ask God to leave, and we could ask Him to leave our lives completely. Yet the Gospel lesson also reassures and comforts us; it reminds us that even if, in our worst moments, we do ask God to leave, God loves us too much to leave us. God desires our salvation too much ever to let us go. God will come again and again.
